


MIKALA MEIZE-BOWERS, PHD

Dr. Mikala Meize-Bowers is a Senior Research Associate at the Washington State Center for Court Research (WSCCR) in the Washington Administrative Office of the Courts. She works with the Behavioral Health Unit to monitor performance, evaluate, and provide technical assistance for therapeutic courts across the state. Over the last year, she has worked with Family Treatment Courts to develop their data, learn how to monitor key metrics, and to use that data to make changes to practices and policies. Dr. Meize-Bowers earned her PhD in Criminal Justice and Criminology from Washington State University where her research focused on the effects of cannabis legalization on juvenile and criminal justice systems.


